Dear Brother:

The prices quoted to colporteurs are to be held strictly confidential. We endeavor to supply the books at prices that will provide commissions to meet the expenses of the service, having in view that for a wide circulation the selling price must be as nearly as possible within the reach of the purchaser. The lower the cost the greater the number who will be able to purchase. We also make a distinction in our prices to colporteurs working isolated territory and to colporteurs working with classes; and since you are canvassing isolated territory, we will supply you all books at cost on the following conditions:

All books so supplied will be disposed of in actual canvassing; that is, they are to be sold to the people at the retail prices set by the Society. No books will be sold to colporteurs working with classes at the rates quoted herein or to the friends or classes at colporteur rates or special class rates. There is no objection to your selling the books to the friends at the regular retail rates. It is further understood that if you find yourself forced to leave the work, such books as you have on hand will be returned to the Society or shipped to such points as the Society may designate, express or freight charges prepaid; and that your account will be credited at the cost price of the books.

Since we are unable to control the cost of the material entering into the manufacture of the books, prices will at times advance or decline in accordance with the cost of material. Books will be charged for at their cost; and in the case of foreign volumes, they, because printed in smaller quantities, will be charged for at a higher rate than the English volumes. If the charges should seem unreasonably high, we will be glad to examine your inquiry; but in most instances the price is on an average of ten to fifteen cents more than the cost of the book in English. Marked differences in price in some of the publications are due to the fact that the present stock of books is a portion of those on hand from contracts with outside printers.

The following prices include the carriers' charges. Books will be shipped charges prepaid when ordered in lots of 100 or more volumes at a time, assorted if you so desire; but the shipment or order should, in each instance, weigh 100 pounds, as all railroad freight rates are quoted on the 100-pound
